Nearly all physicians bill third-party payers for their health care services on a daily basis. All payers, including Medicare, Medicaid and commercial insurance companies, conduct audits to determine appropriateness of billing procedures and treatment utilization. Medicaid audits and fraud investigations are arguably the most prevalent and carry severe penalties.

This two-part seminar will help educate you on fraudulent billing practices and arm you with tools and skills to avoid violations. The first part of this six-hour continuing medical education session will explain how physicians may become subject to an audit or fraud investigation and why it is important to carefully document all patient encounters and properly code all claims.

Representatives of Indiana state agencies and a defense attorney will educate you about how to identify fraud and potential indicators of fraud, how to minimize the likelihood of an audit, and how to protect your legal interests if you do become subject to an audit or investigation.

In many cases, documentation is not sufficient to support the service that was billed. To help you learn how to properly document the medical record, the second half of this seminar will focus on documentation and coding guidelines for Evaluation and Management services. You will have an opportunity to ask questions at the end of the program.

## Seminar Objectives

At the end of this program, the participant should be able to:

1. Recognize how medical records and medical necessity are used in audits
2. Explain how and when fraud investigations are initiated
3. List the possible sanctions available for health care fraud
4. Identify the most common forms/types of health care fraud
5. Identify the major state and federal health care fraud laws
6. Access and search the Federal Exclusion List
7. Discuss how to protect themselves and their legal rights if they are being audited or investigated
8. Develop a plan to prevent fraud
9. Incorporate compliant documentation and coding as an integral component of promoting and providing high quality patient care
10. Recognize the relationship of medical necessity, as indicated by the E/M concept of the nature of presenting problem, to appropriate levels of medical care
11. Interpret the relationship between medical record tools and the ability to provide quality care; this will include an overview of how this concept relates to potential quality barriers in Electronic Health Records
